

Your committee at work

We <u>wrote to our local member Stephen Marshall</u>, urging him to support the private member's bill that would require a decision of both houses of parliament to demolish or significantly alter an item on the State Heritage list.

We made comment in support of the proposed 40kmh speed limit for Norwood and Kent Town.

President Ian Radbone attended the June meeting of the Community Alliance of South Australia, which discussed the early record of the new Planning and Design Code.

Next general meeting

Our next general meeting will be held Wednesday, 21 July at 7.30pm. As usual, it will be at the Don Pyatt Hall. Our guest speaker will be heritage consultant (and NRA member) Sandy Wilkinson.

Sandy will be talking on the topic of redeveloping older properties, rather than bulldozing them. (Our secretary, Tom Smith has written of a <u>recent example of this</u>.)

Sandy has a passion for our built heritage, and will show how buildings can be brought up to modern standards while retaining and often enhancing the character that we so appreciate living in our historic suburb. He will also discuss just how little of our built heritage is actually protected by local or state heritage listing.

The July meeting will also be our AGM. All positions will be declared vacant and we welcome nominations for President, Secretary or Treasurer, as well as nominations to join our committee. (We'd also welcome help even if you don't want to go on the committee, for example, with our Facebook page.)

The AGM will be held after Sandy's presentation and we welcome anyone interested Adelaide's built heritage to attend, whether an NRA member or not.

Council budget

It seems that the Mayor does not like residents associations putting "pressure" on Councillors.

The Council is still in the process of firming up its budget. The Audit Committee expressed concern that with a projected operating surplus of only \$425,000, any additional spending could result in Council going into debt. It recommended that "Council give serious consideration to the identification of Capital Projects that could be deferred to future years in order to improve the cash flow position for the 2021-2022 financial year." (The Committee's minutes provide a good summary of the budget, as at May.)

Mayor Robert Bria responded with a motion to reduce expenditure on the Operating Budget instead, mainly by cutting funding for trees and footpaths, as well as funding on public art and converting private laneways to Council ownership. The Kent Town Residents Association and Greening Joslin both spoke, urging Councillors not to go along with the Mayor's proposal. According to an article in *The Advertiser*, 10 June, both groups were encouraged to do so by Councillor Sims. The article quotes the Mayor as being "disgusted" that Councillor Sims would resort to "pressure tactics".

"What I object to is Cr Sims actively encouraging third parties to come to council meetings to pressure other councillors into voting according to what he wants rather than what is in the public interest."

Council agreed to cut the public art, laneway conversion and extension of water recycling but did not consider cuts to additional trees and footpaths.

Two points to note:


- The projected rate increase of 4.35%, the highest of any metropolitan council, was not affected by the cut. To be fair, this comes after a series of low increases, including a rate freeze last year.
- If history is any guide, there is no danger of the administration spending more that is budgeted. Vacant positions and delayed projects typically (always?) result in underspending.

40kmh speed limit proposal

Voting for the proposed 40kmh speed limit for residential streets closes soon, on Monday 21 June. You can vote on the Norwood Council website. (Or click on the image to the right.)

We understand that the vote will be close and that NRA members are likely to be divided on the issue. Even the committee is not all of the same view. However most of us are, and buoyed by a mostly positive response following our request for your views, we have written to the Council expressing our support. Our reasons for support have been posted in brief on our website.

Kent Town Residents Association President Dr David Baker has written an article in the <u>10 June edition of the Adelaide East Herald</u> urging a vote for the proposed change.

Cressida O'Hanlon to be Labor candidate for Dunstan

O'Hanlon should be familiar to Norwood voters, having run for the federal seat of Sturt in 2019. Dunstan has been a Labor seat in the past. Dunstan of course was a Labor member, as was long-time representative Greg Crafter. And Steven Marshall came close to losing the seat in the 2015 election, when he was Opposition Leader. However a strong showing in the 2018 election, plus electoral boundary review, has given him a 6% buffer for next year's election.

Methylated spirits in the kitchen

BEWARE: KEEP OUT OF REACH of CHILDREN at ALL TIMES

STAINLESS STEEL CLEANER

Methylated Spirits is absolutely the best for streak free cleaning of the sink and stove top. Burnt food on the stove top will require a bit more elbow grease and a non-scratch cleanser but metho is best for daily use. No spots, no streaks, just pour a little on a cloth.

WINDOW CLEANER

When the sun is not shining, add $\frac{1}{2}$ a cup of methylated spirits to a bucket of warm water. Using a large sponge, wring it out in the water, then wipe down window panes. Repeat over all panes. Dry with a lint-free cloth.
